MASTER OF INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS (MIR)

The Master of International Relations (MIR) Programme is a prestigious, well-rounded and challenging programme geared to prepare ambitious students to find their place in the competitive International Relations marketplace. You will gain valuable practical experience during a mandatory internship and via our praxis-oriented curriculum.

The MIR programme provides students with advanced training: one year of coursework, practical work experience (internship), and an academic dissertation. Faculty members with different backgrounds teach various courses including history, economics, political science, law, philosophy, and sociology.

We propose a systematic preparation for authentic postgraduate research or a demanding international career. Our programme of training is tailored for those who have graduated in other fields and wish to transfer to International Relations.

MIR PROGRAMME AIMS

The Geneva School of Diplomacy (GSD) focuses very clearly on preparing individuals to have a successful career in management-level positions. Whether students wish to work within the public or the private sectors, they will have gained essential diplomatic skills by following a theoretical and practical approach proposed during their tenure in the programme. They will have the competencies to

assume the challenges of a job in today's competitive working environment.
